



Our Philosophy

Our goal at Experience Learning is to instill in our students the three key components of our programming:





Our Approach

We believe in the power of wild places.

Our two extensive campuses plus the adjoining millions of acres of National Forest provide a truly wild experience for all participants. There will be no phone reception so students must unplug both their electronic devices and their day-to-day expectations and plug into what is happening exclusively in the here and the now. Their focus will be necessary too as we will challenge them and push the edges of their comfort zones. They will learn risk management and mastery of new skills.

We use small groups to carefully construct a physically and emotionally safe space; a place where everyone has a voice and everyone is respected. We use the small group experience for logistical purposes of safety and because it allows us to have more intimate conversations and ensures participation. When the small groups reconvene the entire class bonds via their separate but shared experiences.

Our highly trained staff is composed of college graduates with rich experience in the education and wilderness adventure fields. They go through rigorous training in our curriculum, methods, and backcountry emergency response.

After we push and prod and explore and adventure, we also take time to reflect. These guided reflections expand each student in their own way, and through this work we are able to break down barriers to friendship, excellence, and understanding.

This component is geared towards lessons focused on understanding our role in the local landscape. Students will get to experiment, practice, and learn while making connections with content that is hard to visualize indoors such as learning geology inside a cave or studying forest ecology and human impact in a red pine grove.





This element is most effectively addressed through immersion experiences. Students will unplug from the hustle and bustle of their daily lives and truly connect with the landscape and with each other through shared experiences in rugged, wild places. We use adventure components to highlight perceived risk, while reflection and group processing allows individuals to realize their own potential and that of the group when working effectively together.

Finally we focus on transferring lessons learned in the field back into the greater school community. This can take the form of leadership intensives or stewardship driven experiences. We also offer a range of unique opportunities to practice and further develop skills like public speaking, writing and journaling, personal awareness, or risk assessment. Along the way, students will assume leadership and followership roles as they learn firsthand what it means to both struggle and succeed through setting and achieving tangible goals.

Program Options

All Experience Learning programming is customized to the needs of our clients.

Wilderness-based Programming

Field-based programs offer the opportunity to truly rely on each other to eat, navigate and to stay warm and dry. These experiences strengthen or refine communication skills along the way and help develop relationships between group members. These courses excel at promoting personal growth and the development of grit, determination and compassion.





Residential programs are ideal for younger populations and shorter stays. Staying in dormitories onsite, our Spruce Knob Mountain Center is the perfect venue for increasing environmental literacy and learning to read the landscape. For some groups this makes the outdoor classroom more accessible and enjoyable.

Looking for the best of both worlds? Some groups prefer to merge both lodging options by camping onsite at our Spruce Knob Mountain Center or Sweetwater Farm with access to amenities and prepared food.

Both types of programs can be run on one of our West Virginia campuses or in a forest, park or wilderness area near you.





Nearby Nature is a regional program that provides teacher professional development and implementation support to engage students in their schools and communities. The program focuses on integrating curriculum with school building and schoolyard investigations to create meaningful and hands-on learning.

Appalachian Watershed & Stream Monitors (AWSM) is a three-part program that involves a summer workshop for teachers, a watershed analysis experience for the class on our campus and then a second watershed analysis in the home community.

Community Action in the Classroom is a collaborative project with Earth Force developed for teachers interested in using their skills to incorporate active civics, Next Generation Science Standards, STEM, and stewardship into their classrooms through project-based learning.

We also partner with school districts and counties to develop county-wide outdoor education programs. These programs focus on connecting students to the natural, human, and cultural assets of their community. Students spend their time immersed in locally-relevant activities and incorporate community members in teaching and sharing.

For

many years, our trip
was connected to our reading
of The Hobbit. Spruce Knob became
the Lonely Mountain, the Sinks of Gandy
served as Gollum's Cave, Spruce Knob Lake
became Long Lake, and the surrounding forest
was Mirkwood. Students worked together to orienteer up a mountain, maneuver a canoe, and traverse
a cave as well as learn about Karst topography, orogeny in the Appalachians, water quality in headwater
streams, and taking care of our environment. They
completed journal entries and creative writing
assignments based on Bilbo's adventures that
fit each location and what they had learned
from each activity.

Campuses and Facilties


We truly believe that we have the best location for outdoor environmental education in the country. Our Spruce Knob base has mountain tops, headwater streams

in both the Chesapeake and Gulf of Mexico watersheds, boulders, wild caves, pristine forests and tree plantations. Our Sweetwater Farm campus adds on-site livestock and agriculture initiatives as well as an area of volcanic activity. Our home is in one of the most diverse ecosystems in the world, with access to the largest uninterrupted tract of National Forest east of the Mississippi River. It is an incomparable course area.

Our main course area is bounded by forest roads, allowing assistance by our support vehicles and more accessible emergency response than any other wilderness. Our combination of proximity to wilderness and to a comfortable base camp gives programs a low risk of failure due to weather conditions.

We understand that some may not be able to join us in West Virginia so we also conduct successful programs elsewhere. We have been running trips along trails and rivers up and down the east coast since the 1970s.







Consulting

If you are excited about developing a school culture of adventure, environmental literacy and personal growth but don't know where to start, Experience Learning offers consulting services to

Summer Programming

In the summer, we use our campus and staff to run summer camps for middle and high school kids, professional development workshops for teachers, and wilderness first aid courses. Organizations rent our facilities for retreats and meetings and we play host to a large bike race and ultra-marathon race. Our campus is almost always available to visitors, campers, star gazers and adventurers to rent tent or yurt space for a nominal fee.
